Mariamar, sempre em primeira pessoa. Ao longo das páginas, o leitor fica sabendo que eles já tiveram um primeiro encontro muitos anos atrás, quando Mariamar era adolescente e o caçador visitou a aldeia. O confronto com as feras leva os personagens a um enfrentamento consigo mesmos, com seus fantasmas e culpas. A situação de crise põe a nu as contradições da comunidade, suas relações de poder, bem como a força, por vezes libertadora, por vezes

opressiva, de suas tradições e mitos.

Marcoré, first published in Rio de Janeiro in 1957, won the coveted prize for fiction awarded by the Brazilian Academy of Letters and has been praised by leading critics and writers in Brazil.
